In our Gospel Reading for this Sunday, we read the second part of the story of Jesus' conversation with his disciples in the northern village of Caesarea Philippi. Last week Peter was the hero – this week, Jesus calls him Satan – what can have possibly gone wrong? As ever, I will try to make sense of it in our Zoom service on Sunday morning and the Epilogue on Sunday evening.



THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS

You can find the Sunday readings and prayers on one of the other attachments or enclosures that I have sent to you. In our Zoom service and Epilogue we will be considering Jesus's prediction of his coming suffering and the reactions of his friends from **Matthew 16.21-28**. In the Old Testament reading from **Jeremiah 15.15-21**, we hear Jeremiah's complaint to God about the insults and persecution he suffers because of his loyalty to God,



and God's promise to deliver him. As we read this passage, we might like to think about some of the Christians throughout the world who are suffering persecution because of their faith – I will be showing some images of some of them following the sermon in our Sunday Zoom service. In our reading from Romans, **Romans 12.9-21**, Paul

continues to set out the ethical and spiritual implications for Christian living in the light of the Gospel. It is a passage worth reading through slowly phrase by phrase, as we examine God's call to us to live the new life in the Spirit. Perhaps at this time one sentence in particular may speak to many of us: ' Rejoice in hope, be

patient in suffering, persevere in prayer.' And one that is always true: 'Do not claim to be wiser than you are' – now there's a challenge to any Christian leader!
